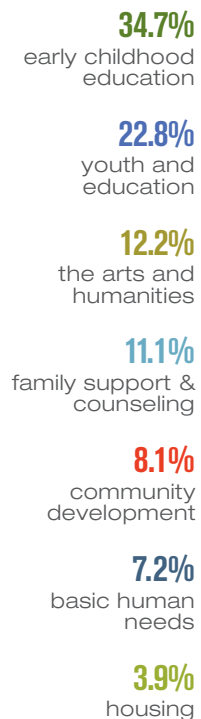


## who your giving reaches

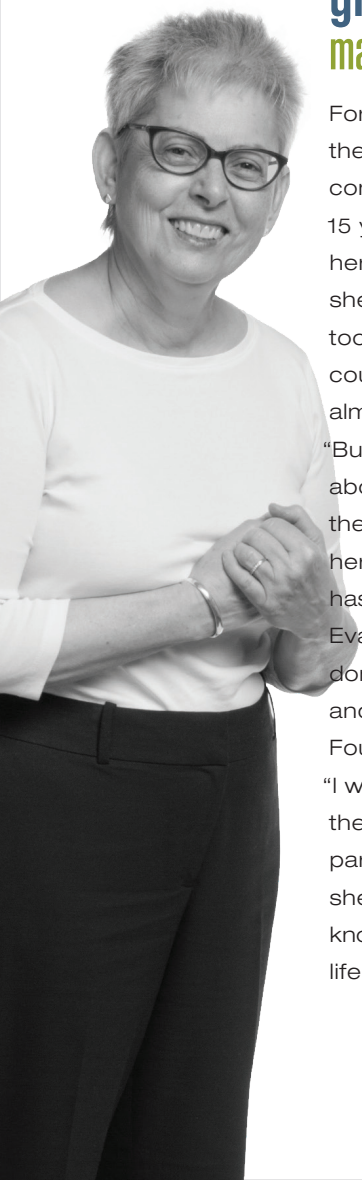

giving makes an impact.

For Jean Shedd, supporting the Foundation with annual contributions for the last 15 years has strengthened her connection with the city she loves. “In 1997, when I took the Leadership Evanston course, I’d been living here for almost 20 years,” she recalls. “But I still learned so much about our community and all the avenues for good work here.” In the years since, Jean has served on the Leadership Evanston steering committee, donated to the program, and given repeatedly to the Foundation’s annual fund. “I want more people to have the opportunity I had to participate in ECF programs,” she says. “I want people to know how much ECF improves life for all of us.”



equity levels the playing field.

This year, when Evanston Cradle to Career focused on summer learning as a path to equity for all our children, collaborations supported by the Foundation played a key role.

The ABC Boosters literacy initiative, which the Foundation has nurtured for five years, more than doubled its reach. Teens from the Youth Job Center are trained at the Evanston Public Library to work with pre-kindergarteners on literacy skills. Often, this is their first satisfying job experience. Thanks to growing community support, these “boosters” helped 75 preschoolers this summer.

The Foundation is proud to support other summer learning initiatives, including the McGaw YMCA’s Power Scholars and the Freedom School created by Garrett Theological Seminary and local churches. Together, we can give all Evanston children what they need to thrive.

listening gets things done.

In July, unexpected changes in funding forced Connections for the Homeless to close Entry Point, their weekday drop-in center on Chicago Avenue. Many of Evanston’s homeless residents had relied on the center for showers and laundry—and now its doors were shut. “Not being able to stay clean takes a horrible toll on people,” says Connections Executive Director Betty Bogg. “It’s dehumanizing. You can’t feel like yourself, and if you have a job you’re likely to lose it.”

On short notice, the Foundation made a grant that helped open the showers two days a week. In addition, Dan Kelch partners with the Foundation to share proceeds from Taco Diablo and Five & Dime, and soon Lulu’s, with local nonprofits on an ongoing basis. This fall, Entry Point was selected to be the recipient of those proceeds.
