Evanston Community Foundation—We're Here for GOOD

With this year's grant awards we begin the Foundation's second 25 years as a growing resource for Evanston's nonprofits, organizations that do so much to strengthen the Evanston community we all call home. Thank you for joining us today!

Today we celebrate 28 grants selected from a pool of 79 proposals requesting \$826,500, together with an exciting special initiative grant. This is the largest-ever response to our request for proposals, and the single most competitive field of proposals we have ever received. If we had the resources, we would have awarded an additional 15 grants, more than doubling the dollars.

The core resource for today's grants is our Fund for Evanston and 10 endowments for more specific purposes, funds from which we draw an annual spending portion while the balances continue to grow in our investment pool. Well more than 2,000 donors have made gifts since 1986 to build ECF's funds for grantmaking and programs. Investment returns of an annual average of 9.2% make gifts of all sizes grow over time! By December 31, the Foundation expects to make grants and distributions of more than \$800,000 in all—our continuing growth makes an ever-larger pool of resources for the work of Evanston organizations.

We are able to award \$240,850 today—more than in any spring grants cycle in our history. For this we thank Northwestern Dance Marathon 2013 and 16 Grantmaking Partners whose contributions let us say "yes!" more often. Their keen interest in the work of Evanston nonprofits and their faith in your capacity to make an impact are expressed through their gifts for this year's grants.

Thanks to what is truly a giving community, we are here for GOOD—a force for positive change, now and forever.

Our goal as Evanston's dedicated funder is to bring Evanston's assets together—its dollars, its people, its organizations—to do great work. With ECF support, our creative and dedicated grantees will address many community challenges and seize a range of opportunities. Although today's grants are for a one-year period beginning July 1, these projects have been selected for their sustainability and potential for long-lasting impact.

We thank the many parts of our community—Evanston's nonprofits, our donors and funding partners, a hard-working grants committee, and our generous host, the North Shore Retirement Hotel—that bring us to this happy occasion.
